## LETTER FROM CAROLINE VODDEN

Well, this is it! After 18 months of candidating and four years of training, I am now (about to be) ordained and inducted to my first pastorate. Having lived all my life in Sussex (more than half of it in Horsham and Southwater) it felt very odd, when asked during our recent holiday 'where do you come from?', to be replying 'Dorset'. But, for me at least, it does not feel strange to be here. There has been a sense of 'rightness' about the whole process since I accepted what I continue to believe was God's call to me to enter the ordained ministry, a sense that I was 'going in the right direction' even though it was never clear to me where I would end up. And throughout this process I have enjoyed unstinting support from my family - Paul, Alice and Ben - who were all so positive after our weekend visit to Broadstone and Lytchett Minster churches last November. Who could possibly have predicted then how dramatically and tragically our lives were about to change?

The last eight months have been so difficult and yet, praise God, we have got through them with the love, support and prayers of so many people - friends, family and strangers. I cannot emphasise too strongly how important such support is at a time of loss - the presence of people to 'carry' you when you feel unable to think clearly or to find the motivation for anything beyond the present moment. We are looking forward now to becoming part of the wider family of the church in Broadstone and Lytchett Minster, a place where Ben was already welcomed and known, albeit briefly, as part of our family. Paul is looking forward to meeting new people and finding new ways of employing his woodland craft skills; Alice will continue into her final year at Caterham School while she explores university and career options for the future. And we all hope to keep in touch, when we can, with friends from Horsham and Southwater and look forward to welcoming people to stay in the Manse in Broadstone.

We had a lovely send-off on a sunny afternoon at the end of July when we were presented with some lovely gifts from the congregation at Horsham. We have not yet christened the picnic hamper - the weather has not been good for picnics and we have been rather preoccupied with unpacking and dealing with all the various tasks associated with moving house - but we look forward to some relaxing days off to come in the beautiful Dorset countryside as well as autumn days planning the garden! In the meantime, Alice has been putting her music stand to good use and the PC Study Bible is sure to be an indispensable addition to the minister's study!

Our thanks to those who sent us on our way with happy recollections and words of encouragement. Our response on that occasion seemed very inadequate, but we struggled to put into words our feelings about leaving Horsham and beginning this new phase of our lives without Ben, who has so

vibrantly pervaded our lives these past twelve years. We continue to give thanks for all that he was and will continue to be to us and to all who had the joy of knowing him.

Thank you for sharing our journey, for your friendship, your faith, your love. We look forward to news of the church family and ask for your continued prayers. May God bless you and guide us all in the days and years ahead as we place our trust in him and in his Son, Jesus Christ.

## **LAUNCH OF 'FROGS'**

A new Junior Church group, formed by the merger of Phoenix and Amity, was launched at the beginning of September. By a decision of those present the name FROGS was chosen which means Forever Reliant On God's Spirit.

The launch took the form of two parts, a breakfast on 2nd September followed by a disco on the evening of 8th September. Both were very well attended. The group will be for all members of Junior Church from Year 7 upwards which potentially could number around 80!

Our format is to meet in the church hall for prayers, introduction to the day's theme and refreshments and then split into two or more activity groups. We have already started with a talk by Sare Basset on an ecological theme linked around the plight of the albatross. You will see more about this in time.

## ECOTIP - ONE PLANET LIVING

If everyone lived as we do in the UK we would need three planets to support us.

We realise we need to change the way we live to beat climate change, save the Amazon and protect our oceans. One Planet Living not only shows how this can be done but also how each of us fits it in. The key to One Planet Living is that individuals, government and business all have their part to play to make sure we are living within the planet's resources.

**Thinking Differently:** Environmentalism is often seen as giving things up. But it's really about doing things better and thinking a little differently:

- Our lives could be improved, if we spent less time in traffic jams, ate better food and saved money with lower energy bills.
- Our choices would be made easier if companies really ensured that their products had a lower environmental impact and if public transport was quicker and cost-effective.
- Climate change would seem less daunting once we saw ourselves as part of the solution not part of the problem.
- Accepting that we really might lose wilderness areas - from British Woodland to African Savannah - puts the changes that we and our governments need to make into context.
